By 9 the pits were getting crowded with the usual suspects and some new ones. One of the most interesting was this twin electric from Rob



Kaley. It's a Gotha Go 244, from a Jack Bale plan, with an 82"inch wing span and 2 brushless outrunners on a 4s 3000mah. The original plane was built as a glider, for troops and equipment (the Gotha go242) then the Germans found a bunch of radial engines and the 244 was born. We didn't see it fly but next comp!

The wind was blowing gently from the sea but the forcast was not good so many people tried to get in early flights. Reg Milsom was an early one who managed a very gentle landing with his huge Cessna on top of a tree! No damage but a bugger to retrieve! The judging was done by fellow fliers taking turns (thanks guys) but a special thank you to Col Simpson who spent a lot of time on the judges bench despite not flying in the comp.

It was good to see so many old faces as visitors like Graham Duckworth and Ron Lucas and also to welcome ex-club member Bruce Gould with his Hurricane and Tim Nolan (of float plane fame) and a huge Wilga.



By lunchtime we had 37 planes registered from 22 pilots (guess the new rules brought some extras out of the cupboard) and most people had flown at least once and welcomed the sausage sizzle from the BBQ. It was then then that the wind turned 180 degrees and produced some nasty swirls over the hill which made it tricky for some of the lighter loaded planes. Mike M had a lot of problems getting his Heinkel off the ground and blamed the wind until he found one wheel had seized on its axle! Dave Pound did an interesting knife edge approach to a landing with his Hurricane claiming he was fumbling for the flap switch in the wrong place - he finished safely in the long grass at the end of the field. He also had to do an emergency landing when the motor over-heated in his new P47 (and he tried to claim it as a designated manoeuvre!). Ron Clarke did his usual fine display with his B25 while Dave Foster & Col Mitchell flew half the UK & German aircraft in WWI. Tom Sparkes managed to keep his Fokker Tripe

(or as Mr P wrote it a "Fokker Tryplane" nice one Dave) upright on the ground most of the time, no small feat for a plane like that. We actually had 2 helicopters though one (what happened Mr Flint) didn't stay long. Andrew Biddlecombe had two AT6s much to the confusion of the judges and Andrew Yu flew Mike M's 19yr old DL5 briefly! There were 3 Tiger Moths, Doug's BIG one, Mike's Medium one and George Kaley's small one.

He also had a scale static score of 38 out of 40 the same as Doug.
